

# **Teacher Resources: Strategies for Discussing Sensitive Topics**

This is a collection of teacher resources that may be helpful for supporting discussion about social justice issues. This list was compiled by the *Strengthening Data Literacy across the Curriculum*, a project at EDC in collaboration with the California Polytechnic State University and the Concord Consortium, funded by the National Science Foundation. These resources are not meant to be a comprehensive guide toward addressing social justice topics in the classroom, but are meant to provide a selection that may be helpful.

The first four resources share strategies for facilitating challenging conversations in the classroom in general. The next four resources share strategies for responding to and facilitating student conversations involving biased remarks, particularly on the topics of immigration and race. A final category of resources provides information to support teaching about controversial topics.

#### For facilitating challenging conversations in general

#### 1. Establishing Classroom Ground Rules

This short resource offers sample ground rules that can be adapted for different classroom contexts to promote an environment of inclusion and respect. The article also includes a link with additional suggestions for *Facilitating Challenging Conversations in the Classroom*.
